Pastor's Ponderings



Sacrificial Service

"For we are God's masterpiece. He has created us anew in Christ Jesus, so we can do the good things He planned or us long ago." – Ephesians 2:10

As mentioned in the previous Crossroads, each month of 2025 we will look at the first part

of our mission statement: **Disciples of Jesus**, Connecting our Community to Christ. A disciple of Jesus reflects God in the world. When Jesus talked about discipleship, it was an all-in kind of thing.

Sacrificial service is doing good works even when it's costly, inconvenient, or challenging. Martin Luther made clear that our good works are not for our salvation, but rather for our neighbor. He describes this as the *Two Kinds of Righteousness* (diagram below). We are made right with God by the good works of Jesus (our vertical relationship with God), which we are completely passive. Our good works toward our neighbor does not make us right with God, but rather our rightness with God overflows into our horizontal relationship with our neighbor. We are active in these good works for the benefit of our neighbor, having nothing to do with our salvation.

For example, a cup of cold water can speak volumes. A generous word can be like water on parched land. We love not only with actions, but with words. Consider the powerful messages we can give one another: You are loved. You have value. Your contribution matters. These are words of life that have the potential to make a deep, long-term impact. Listen to Annie Dillard's words in *The Writing Life*, "Similarly, the impulse to keep to yourself what you have learned is not only shameful, it is destructive. Anything you do not give freely and abundantly becomes lost to you. You open your safe and find ashes."

In addition, remember that you are part of the body of Christ. You are not alone. How are you partnering with others to minister in practical ways? Good news that is really good news has practical implications. It matters to people. It makes a difference in their everyday lives. If your life as a disciple is not doing that, how are you reflecting Jesus to people? When Jesus was asked for proof that he was the Messiah, he cited the practical implications of his ministry: "Jesus told them, 'Go back to John and tell him what you have heard and seen—the blind see, the lame walk, the lepers are cured, the deaf hear, the dead are raised to life, and the Good News is preaching to the poor." – Matthew 11:4-5

Our lives, though likely less miraculous, should reflect the presence of Jesus in practical ways as well. And we cannot do this alone. We need others alongside us to do this. Who can partner with you? Each person will have a unique contribution to make to the whole. Look around to the needs of the community. What would show the presence of God to these particular people? What would be good news to them?

St. Paul wrote to Titus, "Our people must learn to do good by meeting the urgent needs of others; then they will not be unproductive." – Titus 3:14 He also reminded the Galatians the desire of the apostles who sent him out, "Their only suggestion was that we keep on helping the poor, which I have always been eager to do." – Galatians 2:10 We are called to serve the poor in a personal way. This means more than just sending a check. A transactional service like this can make us feel as though we have accomplished something but does little for kingdom impact. Money is money and can help a temporarily poor situation. However, Jesus' concern was not merely helping one change a physical situation. His desire is to impact the spiritual aspect of each person, which includes the physical.

As we interact with the poor, God wants to do work in us as well. We can engage with them as unique individuals made in the image of God, equals to ourselves and our friends and our family. We are to treat them with respect and serve them in ways that will benefit their everyday lives and their growth. Mother Teresa reminds Christ followers, "At the end of life we will not be judged by how many diplomas we have received, how much money we have made, how many great things we have done. We will be judged by 'I was hungry, and you gave me something to eat, I was naked, and you clothed me. I was homeless, and you took me in."

Since we have been made right with God (a.k.a. justified), we can begin to see the

injustice in the world around us. Some injustices are more obvious than others. Some injustices we are less sensitive to than others. The question is, as followers of Jesus, what will we do about it? Will we be silent, saying that's just the way it is? Or will we risk speaking out? Either way, there is a cost. Dietrich Bonhoeffer reminds us of this with these two quotes, "Silence in the face of evil is itself evil: God will not hold us guiltless. Not to speak is to speak. Not to act is to act." And "We are not to simply bandage the wounds of victims beneath the wheels of injustice, we are to drive a spoke into the wheel itself."

These kinds of words can create a fire in one's heart to run out and do something. Yet, we must remember our driving force: compassion. We act not out of anger. We speak not out of frustration. We respond out of compassion and with compassion. We are to be people who care, and out of that care, pray that God will bring about his needed work. Yet cultivating compassion is harder to do than simply taking certain actions or steps. To cultivate compassion, we need to open ourselves up to the pain and the needs of others. That is inherently frightening, threatening to overwhelm us without divine help.

Compassion not only makes us vulnerable to pain, but it puts us face to face with our own sense of inadequacy. We know we are not strong enough, rich enough, smart enough, etc. We are not God; we can only do so much. That's why we bring these needs before him in prayer. We alone cannot bring healing and reconciliation, but we can experience the power of God working through us as we rely on him and listen to his voice and direction.


As C.S. Lewis explained, "To love at all is to be vulnerable. Love anything and your heart will be wrung and possibly broken. If you want to make sure of keeping it intact you must give it to no one, not even an animal. Wrap it carefully round with hobbies and little luxuries; avoid all entanglements. Lock it up safe in the casket or coffin of your selfishness. But in that casket, safe, dark, motionless, airless, it will change. It will not be broken; it will become unbreakable, impenetrable, irredeemable. To love is to be vulnerable."

Scripture to study: Matthew 9:36-38; Matthew 14:14; Matthew 15:32; Matthew 20:34; 1 Peter 3:8-9.

As I write on each topic, I encourage you to meet with one, two, or three other people. Discipleship is not an individual endeavor. Use the articles for discussion, read and study the scripture together, and encourage each other in your walk. The result will be transformation – not of ourselves only – but of others and the whole community around us.

Browning's poem *Pippa's Song* always come to mind. After the cold and what some may consider the bleakness of winter, we enter a time of rejuvenation – spring. As plants come to life and gardens and fields are readied for planting, we are reminded that we are the stewards of the earth and the environment that God has entrusted to us. A steward has the responsibility of caring for whatever is entrusted into his or her care. With respect to the earth, God tells us of this expectation in Genesis 2:15 where it is stated, "Then the Lord God took the man and put him into the garden of Eden to cultivate it and keep it."

In addition to spring reminding us of our responsibility as stewards of the earth, the special days of Mother's Day in May and Father's Day in June remind us that the Christian home is also a place of stewardship – stewardship of family. "As each has received a gift, use it to serve one another, as good stewards of God's varied grace..." **1 Peter 4:10** ESV
