Pastor's Ponderings


"Celebrating the Past, Embracing the Future, Rooted in Christ" Colossians 2:6–7

Dear Brothers and Sisters in Christ,

As we approach the close of 2025 and look with anticipation toward 2026, I want to share some important updates about our communication as a congregation, reflect on the journey we have taken together this past year, and look forward with joy to the celebration of Christmas and the New Year.

A New Season for Communication

Beginning in January 2026, St. Mark will shift from our long-standing monthly *Crossroads*



newsletter to a weekly rhythm of communication through our email updates. This change enables us to share news, prayer needs, and ministry stories more promptly and effectively. You can expect the same kinds of helpful content you've enjoyed in *Crossroads*, now delivered in smaller, more regular pieces designed to keep us connected throughout the week.

Looking Back: A Year of Growing as Disciples

This past year, we intentionally focused on the first part of our mission statement: "Disciples of Jesus, Connecting our Community to Christ." Throughout 2025, we explored what it means to be a disciple of Jesus through eight key dimensions of

discipleship:

- Experiencing God learning to recognize His presence in worship, prayer, and Scripture.
- Spiritual Responsiveness listening for the Spirit's prompting and stepping out in obedience.
- Generous Living embracing a lifestyle of gratitude, stewardship, and service.
- Disciple Making growing in confidence to share the hope of Christ with others.
- Personal Transformation allowing Christ to shape our character and daily life.
- Authentic Relationships investing in genuine community rooted in grace and truth.
- Community Transformation seeking the good of Mendon and our surrounding neighborhoods.

I'm grateful for the ways these qualities have taken deeper root among us—through worship, prayer, learning, service, and fellowship. It has been a joy to see God shaping us into a community of disciples grounded in His grace.

A Season of Hope: Christmas and New Year's

As we prepare to celebrate Christmas, we remember that everything we do as a church—every act of service, every prayer, every step of discipleship—flows from the good news that "the Word became flesh and dwelt among us." Christ's coming is the source of our hope, the anchor of our faith, and the light that shines into every corner of our lives.



Council News



He spreads the snow like wool and scatters the frost like ashes. Psalm 147:16 NIV

This verse describes a familiar scene for those of us who live in the northeast. But whether the snow arrives or not, in December we finally enter the "official" Christmas season—Advent, Christmas, and then the 12 days of Christmas leading to Epiphany. How interesting it was to observe that the country seemed to begin the Christmas season around the time of Halloween, and we will probably see it end Christmas night. The world seems to encourage everyone to characterize Christmas as a party, a burst of abundance and overindulgence. People tend to buy more, spend more on what is bought,

eat more, and go out more. It seems that we live in a world that is caught up in a party

mode and concentrating on the abundance or expense of things above all else. And then the party ends, Christmas day is over, and the world moves on.

The Bible tells us the Wise Men brought precious gifts to Jesus. "...and they fell down and worshiped him. Then, opening their treasures, they offered him gifts, gold and frankincense and myrrh." Matthew 2:11 ESV That was a sign of how important He was to them. How important is Jesus to you? If we consider Christmas like a birthday party for Jesus, just imagine if a party were planned for you but no one came or everyone went somewhere else to celebrate instead of with you and gave each other a gift but did not include you. Are you coming to God's house to celebrate His birthday? What are you giving Jesus for Christmas?

In our plans of the season, do we think about the gifts we give to everyone but Jesus? One might ask, "What can I give to Jesus?" The little drummer boy played a song, but you can give Him your trust (faith is voluntary). You can make him the center of your life (and avoid making idols of other things). You can give him all of yourself – thought, word, and deed. You can bring others to Jesus; that was His plan, his directive to us. These are valuable gifts to give to our Lord; gifts you can give every day, not just on Christmas day. As you make your list of things that you hope to receive as a gift or a list of what you are giving to others, remember to make your list of what you can give to God. God gave his Son, Jesus for you. Jesus suffered and gave his life for you.

As a church some of the gifts we give to Jesus throughout the year include the myriad aspects of our time, talent and treasure as the pastor expounded on in the explanation of the four Rs Repentance, Relationships, Responsibilities, Resources. Throughout the year, members of Council take care of the daily/routine needs of the church and currently continue work on strategic planning and budget preparation. A meeting of the voters assembly will be held on December 21 to present these matters.

While we are all enjoying Christmas, we need to remember to thank God for all the gifts he has given to us, especially his Son Jesus Christ. Also, let us each remember to be good Christians stewards of all that God has given us and to continue Christmas all year. As Mother Teresa said, "It is Christmas every time you let God love others through you. Yes, it is Christmas every time you smile at your brother and offer him your hand."



Colors of The Church Year

The Church Year Begins - November 30, 2025

Happy New Year! Those words typically refer to January 1. In business, someone may ask is the new year the fiscal year or the calendar year. In academia, someone may ask if the new year is referring to the academic year, the fiscal year, or the calendar year. In the church, we refer to the church or liturgical year.

The Liturgical Year centers upon events in the life of our Lord Jesus and His Church. The first half of the church year centers on the life of Jesus. Since most popular holidays, such



as Christmas and Easter, occur in this period, this is called the Festival Half of the Church Year. The second half of the church year is called the Non-festival Half or the Church Half of the church year.

The church recognizes different Sundays, seasons, feasts, festivals, and days of commemoration, with applicable songs, other music, words, and readings, but the church year is also reflected in the use of color. Watch the colors of the vestments and altar paraments change throughout the seasons and on special festival days. Pastor Urlaub often matches the color of this shirt to a festival day; have you noticed? The paraments reinforce or reflect the sense of the season in colors. There is much that could be said about each color and each season, below is a simple summary.

Enjoy the colors of the church year.

Advent: The church year begins with Advent which begins in either November or December, depending on the year. It is the four-week preparation for the coming of Jesus on Christmas Day. This year, the first Sunday in Advent is November 30. The color purple or violet is used as a color of penitence or royalty. Some churches, including ours, use blue representing the sky and a color of hope.

Festival of the Nativity of our Lord Christmas – White is the color of this season, which signifies joy. Christmas Day begins the 12 days of Christmas that end with Epiphany on January 6.

Epiphany Season – This season can have up to 8 Sundays. White is the color of the season for the first Sunday. Green is the color for the remaining Sundays, which signifies growth. It is by far the most common color seen during the year. The last Sunday of the Epiphany Season is Transfiguration Sunday, and the color is white.

Lenten Season – This season begins on Ash Wednesday, has 40 days and six Sundays. The color is purple which signifies repentance and penitence.

Holy Week – This week begins on Palm Sunday and ends with the Festival of the Resurrection. The color is purple or scarlet on Palm/Passion Sunday and until Maudy Thursday when the color is white. On Good Friday there is no parament, or black, the color of sorrow or death.

Easter (Festival of the Resurrection of our Lord) Season— This season has 7 Sundays, and the color is white. In addition to joy, white signifies new life. This is a Festival of our Lord.

Pentecost Season – This is the longest season and has 24–27 Sundays. Colors include the following: First Sunday, Pentecost Sunday, is red (which signifies power); second Sunday (Trinity Sunday) is white; and all other Sundays the color is green which signifies growth. The last Sunday in Pentecost season is the last Sunday of the church year and, also Christ the King Sunday. For those who celebrate this Sunday Christ the King Sunday, the color is white which signifies Victory – a festival of our Lord.

Trinity Guest House

Help Support Missionaries and Mission Volunteers in Liberia: The Trinity Guest House is located within the Lutheran Liberia Mission Community approximately 50 miles from Monrovia and provides temporary housing to stay in safety and comfort for visiting missionaries and mission volunteers supporting the Lutheran Liberia Mission. They are seeking monetary donations to help with their current projects and buildings. Woodworking tools and machines were donated for vocational training and for pastors to be able to support themselves. Work has begun on a technical education building but funds to

Stamps for Bibles

Eastern District LWML collects cancelled postage stamps for the Canadian Bible Society which uses the stamps to purchase Bibles for prisoners. These hand-delivered Bibles become living water when chaplains share the love of Jesus with a person in prison.



For stamp collection, please cut out the stamps from the regular mail and Christmas cards that you receive. Remember, to cut ½ inch around each stamp, BUT do not throw stamps away if you cut a little too close. Cut-out stamps can be used AS LONG AS THE PERFORATIONS are all intact. Deposit stamps in the "Stamp Jug" in the narthex. Please continue to pray for the prisoners and chaplains; and remember to keep saving those stamps all year long.

St. Pauly Shed

When cleaning out closets, please remember to donate to St. Pauly Textiles. From the website (https://www.stpaulytextile.com/about-us), "St. Pauly Textile Inc. is a Western NY based, family owned for-profit company and an A+member of the Better Business Bureau. Our goal is to get USEABLE clothing to people who can use it, here in the U.S. and in developing countries, while having a meaningful impact in our local communities."



"What to Drop-off: [Gently] Used Clothing, shoes, sneakers, belts, purses, linens, pillowcases, blankets, curtains, and stuffed animals.

What **Not** to Drop-off: Furniture, electronics, household items, books, toys, garbage, pillows, rags, and fabric scraps." This is important to note because we have had several "unacceptable" donations for St. Pauly that result in us having to throw them in the dumpster, however, they could have been donated elsewhere.

In addition, to the donations helping people in need in the United States and around the world, St. Mark gets paid per pound of donations. Many thanks to Joyce Haag for taking care of prepping the shed for the weekly pick-ups from the box in the St. Mark parking lot.
